COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is catered to those seeking to enrich their drawing portfolio in the heart of Paris, France. Students will develop stronger visual vocabulary and keen observational skills in producing a personal portfolio and discovering their own artistic interests. Students will visit the Luxembourg Gardens, Centre Pompidou, Pére Lachaise, Musée d'Orsay, Palais de Tokyo, Fondation Cartier as well as the Louvre Museum.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Define and utilize various drawing materials such as pencil and ink.
- Distinguish and develop the foundational elements of drawing (composition, line, form, light/shadow, etc.).
- Apply the foundational elements of drawing to still-life, the model, nature, and urban landscape.
- Develop a total of 50 drawings from observation in a sketchbook (format A4).
- Create and select two final large drawings (format A3).
- Participate in the creation of a collective drawing on a large-scale format.
- Learn how to display diverse creations during a final exhibition.
- Develop observational skills and confidence through execution.
- Build visual vocabulary to effectively communicate ideas.

ASSESSMENT

Students will be assessed on the following criteria:
50 Sketchbook Drawings + 2 final large drawings + 1 final large collective drawing 50%
Presentation of Final Portfolio Drawings 40%
Attendance and in-class participation

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

10%



This course will involve participation in the form of studio work, field trips, discussions, presentations, and independent dialogue with faculty. Each class will include active studio sessions involving students exploring drawing foundational principles in-studio and on external field trips. The workshop will allow participants to share ideas and receive feedback toward developing a final drawing portfolio.

ATTENDANCE

Students are expected to fully participate in every session to be sure not to miss important information, which will lead to the successful completion of the course

Substantial absences are factored into grades. Please note the following:

- 2 late arrivals (more than 15 minutes) or early departures = one full absence
- 2 absences = excessive absence for a course that meets once per week
- 3 absences are grounds for failure in the course

COURSE SCHEDULE

Monday, June 1

Morning:

Identifying, test and explore various drawing materials.

Group Activity: Practicing on still life form.

Studying the elements of art: line, pattern, space, and value.

Afternoon:

Improve the skills and concepts seen during the morning on human size installation in the Palais de Tokyo.

Assignment: In your sketchbook, create 5 drawings.

Tuesday, June 2

Morning:

Studying the principles of art: movement, scale, form and shape.

Group Activity: Practicing through a drawing session with a model.

Afternoon:

Improve the skills and concepts seen during the morning. Observing and drawing a public space from a person to a crowd, from clouds to trees in the Jardin du Luxembourg.

Assignment: In your sketchbook, create 5 drawings.

Wednesday, June 3

Morning:

Learning the fundamentals of linear perspective.

Studying the principles of art: Vanishing point, horizon, orthogonal lines, shadows.

Group Activity: Create an imaginary view of a Piranesian space.

Afternoon:

Improve the skills and concepts seen during the morning. Observing and drawing the Pére Lachaise cemetery.

Assignment: In your sketchbook, create 5 drawings.

Thursday, June 4

Morning:

Exploring the use of colors.



Studying the principles of art: gradient and combination.

Afternoon:

Improve the skills and concepts seen during the morning. Observing and drawing from master pieces of expressionism and fauvism in Musée d'Orsay. <u>Assignment:</u> In your sketchbook, create 5 drawings.

Friday, July 5

Field trip in Musée du Louvre

Studying the principles of art: Drawing figurative sculptures within architecture and exploring composition (portrait and landscape orientation, micro and macro format).

<u>Assignment:</u> In your sketchbook, create 5 drawings. (please bring a picnic)

Monday, July 8

Morning:

Introduction on how to draw the invisible: climate, abstraction, science, and objectivity.

Group Activity: Create an atlas of invisible phenomena.

Afternoon:

Improve the skills and concepts seen during the morning via a field trip to the Fondation Cartier where we can learn how to draw transparency, reflection, and the blurred notion of in and outside.

Assignment: In your sketchbook, create 5 drawings of invisible phenomena.

Tuesday, July 9

Introducing the link between photography and drawing.

Group Activity: Create different drawing from personal photography taken during the previous field trips, exercise of collage.

Studying the principles of art: documents, documentary, fragment, point of view, series.

<u>Assignment:</u> In your sketchbook, create 5 drawings from personal photography.

Wednesday, July 10

Morning:

Review of all drawings.

Group Activity: Display and comment on each other's drawings. Selecting and editing some of the drawings.

Afternoon:

Exploring drawing the landscape from trees to horizon.

Field trip: parc des Buttes Chaumont.

Studying the principles of art: the view from above, complexity.

Assignment: In your sketchbook, create 5 drawings.

Thursday, July 11



Morning:

Field trip to the Centre Pompidou.

Studying the principles of art: abstract drawing.

Afternoon:

Create two big scale personal drawings and one collective drawing.

Assignment: In your sketchbook, create 5 drawings.

Friday, July 12

Discussion and presentation of Artwork:

Showcasing sketches and drawings completed on field trips and at home.
